Please remember that we are not going to be able to agree as much funding as we have been as both recovery funding and Pupil Premium Plus funding for looked after children have ended. This may impact the funding of things such as after school clubs etc.

## Working together to improve school attendance

## Important changes to Attendance coding

Please be aware that attendance coding has changed and make sure you are familiar with the new codes listed in <u>Working together to improve school attendance (applies</u> from 19 August 2024) (publishing.service.gov.uk).

Please be mindful that the **part-time timetable code** has changed and is now **C2**. The Virtual School will have oversight of all CLA, CIN and CP cases on a part time timetable to ensure this is carefully managed and time-limited.

Please also be aware of two new codes around transport. Firstly **Q** is for children who are legally entitled to transport but are awaiting transport to be set up by the Local Authority. Secondly, **Y1** is for those who have Local Authority transport in place, but on a given day it was not available. Also **Y5**, unable to attend as pupil is in criminal justice detention i.e. in police detention or remanded in youth detention awaiting sentencing.

Inactive Codes— **H, Y and J**. If any service children require Holidays in term time than schools should use the code **C**. The **J** code has been replaced by a new code **J1** and has changed from an Approved Educational Activity to Authorised Absence.

### **Kinship Care**

Kinship care is when a child lives full-time or most of the time with a relative or close family friend. In the UK there are over 180,000 children in kinship care. Grandparents are the most common kinship carers. Kinships carers are something referred to as 'connected people'. There are different types of kinship care.

- It might be an informal arrangement were someone looks after a child but they do not have parental responsibility and are not in the care of the LA.
- A family court might have awarded a special guardianship order where PR is shared with the child's parents but carers can make nearly all major decisions about the child without asking the parent's permissions.
- A court could award a child arrangements order. Again PR is shared but parents must be included in big decisions.

Kinship

• A family member or friend could become a child's foster carer—they are then considered 'looked after' by the LA who shares PR with the parents.

Private fostering is when someone who is not a child's parent or close relative looks after a child for 28 days or more. If you suspect a child is being privately fostered, please inform the LA immediately.

Kinship Care Week (7 to 13 October 2024) is an opportunity to celebrate the incredible role that kinship carers play in children's lives and society. It's also an important time to help everyone understand what kinship care is.

This year, the theme of Kinship Care Week is #ThisIsKinshipCare. Each and every kinship family has a unique story based on both their happy memories, as well as their challenging experiences. Please help to shine a light on these stories and to recognise these diverse and inspiring kinship families. Joining in with Kinship Care Week 2024 will help aise awareness about kinship care and what life is like for kinship families.


